Crackdown on shops selling banned tobacco products in Tiruppur

The Food Safety Department, since the start of June, has caused a deterrent effect on sellers of banned tobacco products in the district by sealing shops and imposing hefty fines.

Seventy-eight shops found selling products such as gutka, cool lip, and pan masala were sealed so far this month. The banned products to the extent of 620 kg were confiscated and destroyed.

Fines to the extent of ₹21.25 lakh were imposed on the shops by teams of Food Safety Department officials led by the Designated Officer for Food Safety and Drug Administration in Tiruppur district P. Vijayalalithambikai. The surprise raids were carried out under the instructions of Collector T. Christuraj.

On its part, the District Tobacco Control Cell (DTCC) in Tiruppur has also been mandated with the task of complete eradication of the banned tobacco products through implementation of the Guidelines for Tobacco Free Educational Institution (Revised)" for effective implementation of Section-6 of COTPA (The Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products Act), 2003.

As per the revised guidelines, the management of the educational institution should ensure that no tobacco products are sold inside the premises and in an area within 100 yards from the premises. Any violation should be reported to the National Quitline at 1800-11-2356.

Dr. Vijayalalithambikai also invited the public to pass on information over phone: 9444042322, in the event of clandestine sale of tobacco products, or lodge complaint through TN Food Safety Consumer App.

City Police to sensitise parents, school authorities to helmet rule compliance

ith the police coming across a lot of instances of elders not wearing helmets when they come to schools to drop and pick up children, the Coimbatore City Police have decided to sensitise them to the importance of helmet compliance.

City Police Commissioner V. Balakrishnan told *The Hindu* the initiative is also meant to sensitise elders and school authorities to ensure that children also wear helmets.

"The traffic police officers will first approach all the schools in the city and speak to the school management committee, teachers and parents

teachers association. Once they are sensitised, they will convey the message to the parents and children,"

The traffic police personnel, who are posted to ease congestion in front of schools in the city, will also speak to elders and parents and educate them

about the illegality and risks of not wearing helmets.

According to traffic police personnel, several parents are seen riding two-wheelers with their children in precarious ways. Some of them are found riding two-wheelers with two or more children.

"Riding two-wheelers with children aged five or six on the pillion is risky, especially when the vehicle is driven at a high speed or while crossing a speed breaker or negotiating potholes. Some children are even seen sleeping on the vehicle and parents are not aware of it. Such situations highlight the need for children to wear helmets," said a traffic police officer.

Natham land document registration to resume

The Registration Department has issued a circular asking the sub-registrars to resume registration of natham land documents without delay.

In a circular dated June

21, the Department clarified that all grama natham residential sites have survey number and guideline value. The patta empty/ with house residential sites were classified as ryotwari residential sites (except Chennai city). These are given new survey numbers and are getting uploaded on the Tamil Nilam portal. But, the new survey numbers are not added in the guideline value registry and new guideline value should be fixed. Since there is a delay in this process, the registrars should get the details from the Revenue Department, fix guideline value for these sites, and add the details to the guideline registry within a month. There should be no delay in registering these documents, it said.

A senior official of the

Registration Department in Coimbatore said the natham sites that are in the name of individuals are now classified as ryot sites and assigned new survey number. These will be uploaded online. The site numbers of these plots are yet to be updated fully on the portal. So, the respective district registrar will collect the details from the revenue officials concerned, fix the guideline value for the site and update it in the guideline registry. This should be done for all such sites within a

K. Kathirmathiyon, secretary of Coimbatore Consumer Cause, said there were problems related to Revenue and Registration Departments for the natham sites across the State. Now, the Registration Department has come out with measures so that the public are not affected. The Revenue Department should also look at such measures, he said.

Passenger stopped at airport following discrepancy in passport

Officials at the immigration bureau stopped a passenger at the Coimbatore International Airport on Sunday following discrepancy in her passport.

The passenger has been identified as U. Thahira, 61, of Naduvilangadi in Malap-

puram district in Kerala.

According to the police, Thahira came to the airport with her husband on Sunday to fly to Singapore by Scoot airlines flight late at night. Her husband submitted her passport at the immigration desk for verification. The immigration official noticed that the bio of the woman was evident-

ly found pasted on the passport.

The immigration official checked the details of the passport and found out that it was an expired passport issued in the name of her son-in-law Ajmal K.V., 44, of Malappuram.

The immigration official lodged a complaint with the Peelamedu police and

a case was registered against Thahira and Ajmal for offences under Sections 12 (b) (knowingly furnishes any false information), (d) (knowingly uses a passport or travel document issued to another person), and (e) (knowingly allows another person to use a passport or travel document) of the Pass-

ports Act, 1967 and 465 (punishment for forgery) and 471 (using as genuine a forged document) of the IPC. "In fact, the woman has a valid passport. But she attempted to travel using an expired passport. We need to question Ajmal to find out more about the incident," said a police officer.


